Newsy Happenings Quarter Century Ago

(From The Journal, March 12, 1909) The annual meeting of the Windsor Locks Business Men's Association was held in the Town hall Monday evening and officers and committees elected for the year, reports of the past year given and votes of thanks extended to officers and directors for their work during the year. The board of officers selected included the following: President, Howard S. Pease; first vice-president, Henry N. Lebell; second vice-president, Gilbert B. Sterling; secretary, F. S. Bidwell, Jr.; treasurer, James D. Outerson; directors, the officers and John M. Morse, Henry L. Cutler, Charles D. Cannon and Addison B. Stockwell, state director, Clarence W. Mather.

In response to a petition of the board of education the selectmen have called a special town meeting for next Thursday evening to take action on installing a new boiler at the public school building and the erection of a separate building to house the same. The present boiler in the basement of the main building has outlived its usefulness and the wisdom of having the heater in a building by itself has suggested itself forcibly of late. The whole cost is estimated at \$3,500.

While hunting foxes in the western part of the town this week, William Baskerville came across the partly exposed carcasses of seven dead horses in a wooded section near the Rainbow line. Indications are that someone had used the place to bury horses and that foxes or other animals had unearthed the bodies. The town officers will look into the matter and see that the carcasses are re-interred.

Mrs. Catherine Kelly, wife of Anthony Kelly, died at her home in Springfield, Thursday, after a prolonged illness that resulted from a stroke she suffered a few years ago. She was a daughter of the late Thomas Burke of this town and the funeral will be held Monday, requiem mass to be celebrated in St. Mary's church here and burial will be in St. Mary's cemetery.

The property of George P. Osborn, situated below the railroad crossing at the south part of the town, was sold this week to a couple of men in the name of the Jewish Agricultural and Industrial Society of New York. The property comprises about forty acres of land with the house and barns on it.

Mrs. Azubah Ferry observed her 92d birthday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Almada Adams, on Spring street Thursday. Mrs. Ferry is quite active and possessed of all her faculties for one of her advanced years.

Jeremiah McCarty, aged 55 years, died suddenly at the home of Joseph F. Hayes while eating supper last evening, death being due to a heart attack. He was a native of Ireland, but had lived for many years in Broad Brook where he was employed by Mr. Hayes. He leaves no immediate relatives. The funeral was held this morning from St. Catherine's church and burial was in the cemetery at Broad Brook.

Kenneth Winn of East Windsor lost the sight of one eye Wednesday, when struck by a cross-bow in the hands of a son of John Titus as they were playing in the schoolyard at Scantic. Dr. H. S. Backus was summoned and young Winn was taken to St. Francis hospital in Hartford where every effort was made to save the sight of the eye, but the wound inflicted impaired the sight.

The board of relief of Suffield has completed its work on property lists and increases totaling \$35,650 were made on tobacco in the hands of packers over last year's totals. The board had twenty-six appeals for reductions of which sixteen were reduced and four increased. The total grand list is \$3,679,167, a slight increase over last year's.

A trolley car of the Hartford and Springfield street railway company went off the tracks near the residence of G. G. Parmelee in Boston Neck last evening, disarranging the schedule. The Springfield cars ran down as far as the disabled one and passengers were transferred around it so that traffic could be kept moving.
